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CRYPTIC MASONS MEDICAL RESEARCH FOUNDATION

CMMRF Update from the Indiana University School of Medicine

Many of the board members with CMMRF, along with a few medical professionals from around the world, traveled to Indianapolis and were greeted by the men and women who transform the funding from CMMRF into cutting edge medical breakthroughs. The physicians and research scientists were eager to show off their accomplishments to us, and displayed the utmost gratitude for providing the funds needed to pursue their research.

The morning started out with Dr Hanaa Aridi, who opened our eyes to the numbers of leg amputation and how skin color and socio-economic status play a role in these amputations and in seeking treatments in a timely manner. "Non-white race alone more than doubles the risk of primary amputation in patients with Critical Limb Threatening Ischemia (CLTI) and lowers the rate of utilization of limb salvage techniques by at least 28%" (Anjorin AC et al, J Vasc Surg 2022:75(6):e77-8). For instance, African Americans have a higher rate of peripheral arterial disease and diabetes, they tend to seek help after the disease process has become more advanced, have increased mobility issues, and are less likely to be treated with optimal medical therapy or to undergo limb salvage therapy. In other words, they wait too long to get help, and the help they need may not be available to them.

The American Heart Association has a goal to reduce the number of leg amputations by 20% by 2022. This directly impacts our research, as our 'seed money' from CMMRF can be used to provide even more funding in this same area that we have been funding for years! This is like striking gold, but in the medical field. This is like investing in Bitcoin before it was popular.

After this emotional presentation, we heard from Leni Moldovan, Ph.D, who reiterated the importance of the CODEX and spoke about the breakthrough in finding stem cells regenerating outside of the initial treatment areas, proving that the cells are repopulating in the entire area. A newer CODEX machine is about to be replaced with an upgraded PhenoCycler-Fusion system, also from Akoya Bio, and it should work faster, cheaper, and with greater capabilities. The CODEX can map millions of cells and their interaction with each other. This is like finding a needle in a haystack. The computing power is also amazing, analyzing data upwards of 5-10 TeraBytes. The downside of operating this piece of equipment is the astronomical costs of the 'consumables' which can average \$1300 for each antigen introduced into the sample. But the data received from the test, which can show the interaction between the cells, paves the way for new treatments and the reduced time to fully understand the treatment responses.

Dr. Mervin Yoder reiterated the important part that stem cells play in the prevention of amputations resulting from Critical Limb Threatening Ischemia. By using cultured stem cells and adding a few genes to direct their growth, they can create the desired stem cell with the desired effect within the body. His work is directed towards repairing the blood vessel's inner walls. His biggest hurdle is finding the correct cell to study and attempt to replicate. This isn't a needle in a haystack scenario; this is a needle in the hayfield scenario. As soon as they can manufacture these colony forming cells in the lab, many of these problems with Abdominal Aortic Aneurysms and Peripheral Artery Disease can be corrected, thus preventing invasive surgeries, loss of limbs, and potentially preventable death.

Steven Miller, Ph.D. followed up the discussion by reiterating how stem cells can be harvested, whether through bone marrow, umbilical cord blood, more especially the middle of the backbone from healthy young females. With the use of specially bred diabetic mice, called TALLYHO mice, they are essentially destroying the arteries to a leg and injecting stem cells to try to regrow the blood vessels. This is also one of the uses of the Buchi Encapsulator (purchased by CMMRF funding) to surround these stem cells and protect them, while also allowing the cells to perform as intended. These cells were also discovered in parts of the leg that were not injected with stem cells, showing that they are thriving and doing their jobs.

Finally, Nicanor Moldovan, Ph.D. discussed the newest prototype of the BioPencil, a device that will be used to precisely deliver stem cells to certain parts of the body, such as the Abdominal Aorta. This device can do so much more, including delivering stem cells to regrow bones in the body as well as outside of the body. The smallest bone in the body, the ear ossicles, can be recreated with bio-printers such as the BioPencil, indicating that hearing loss may be treated through other means than just hearing aids. This same device can be used to aid in the regrowth of select tissues within the eyes, intestines, blood vessels, lungs, etc. The research is being done throughout many VA hospitals ranging from coast to coast, with Indiana University as their primary hub for research and utilizing bio-printing in their practice.

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This has all been done through the continuing support of CMMRF and Companions throughout the world. The world of medicine is advancing at an incredible rate, and we are standing at the summit of these advancements. If you do not understand any of this, just know that our donations to CMMRF are about to rewrite the medical journals and change the way that our medical conditions are treated.

Cell-based therapies to prevent limb loss continue to grow at the Indiana Center for Regenerative Medicine and Engineering

Critical Limb Threatening Ischemia (CLTI) is the most severe form of peripheral arterial disease caused by atherosclerotic occlusion of blood vessels to the lower extremities. It is often associated with excruciating pain and leads to the development of skin ulcers or gangrene.

The standard of care for CTLI is to improve blood flow to the leg with either a surgical bypass or angioplasty with stents to open the atherosclerotic blockages. Unfortunately, about 30 percent of patients with CLTI will not be candidates for a surgical bypass or angioplasty and amputation is the only treatment available to remove a painful or infected leg. In the United States. Amputations are the sixth costliest operation to the national health care system, with over 53,000 performed each year. This cost has driven interest in cell-based therapies for wound healing and restoring blood perfusion in critical limb ischemia patients.

The Indiana Center for Regenerative Medicine and Engineering (ICRME) has been at the national forefront in developing cutting-edge approaches to treat "no option" for revascularization CLTI patients. Michael P. Murphy, MD, the Cryptic Masons Medical Research Foundation Professor of Vascular Biology Research, has been actively focusing of cell-based approaches for cardiovascular disease for over the past 20 years beginning as a research fellow at Harvard University Medical School.

Murphy conducted the first trial in the U.S. using a patient's own bone marrow cells to prevent amputations. His pioneering work culminated in the MOBILE (MarrowStim Treatment of LimB IschemIa in Subjects with Severe Peripheral Arterial DiseasE) trial—a randomized, placebo-controlled trial that assessed the ability of intra-muscular injection of a patient's bone marrow cells to prevent amputation.

The MOBILE study demonstrated that cell therapy was safe, however there was not a significant difference in amputation rates at one-year between the cell treated and placebo groups. The MOBILE trial was uniquely designed to distribute patients with diabetes and a foot ulcer evenly between study groups so that additional analyses could assess these factors on outcomes.

Murphy's group found that diabetes and presence of a foot ulcer had a negative effect on cell therapy and they surmised that any future trials would require a potentially more potent cell population as bone marrow progenitor cells from patients with advanced disease and age are impaired in their regenerative potential.

"My moonshot is to develop an effective strategy that incorporates a multi-modal approach to limb preservation in the diabetic patient with vascular disease," said Murphy.

To get to the moon, Murphy has teamed up with Sashwati Roy, PhD, professor of surgery and Director of Clinical Research at the IU Health Comprehensive Wound Center. Roy has been focusing on diabetic wounds and has developed a unique wound dressing, an electroceutical pad, that transmits an electrical current into the soft tissue of the wound that disrupts the biofilm produced by invading bacteria. Once the biofilm is disrupted, antibiotics and other treatments will have a more profound effect in eradicating the bacteria and stimulating the wound to heal.

Murphy also has joined forces with Emily Hopewell, PhD, Director of Cell and Gene Therapy Manufacturing at IU School of Medicine, and Erik Woods, PhD of Ossium Health, Inc. Ossium Health has isolated a unique cell, a mesenchymal stromal cell (MSC) from the vertebral bodies of young, healthy organ donors. These vertebral body MSCs (VB-MSCs) have shown a significant effect in promoting muscle and blood vessel regeneration in a diabetic mouse model of CLTI, and Murphy and Hopewell are working on getting FDA approval to use VB-MSCs in the next generation of clinical trials.

Murphy and Roy are planning a program grant through the National Institutes of Health that will explore the potential synergy of intra-muscular injection (two doses) and application of Roy's electroceutical dressing for foot wounds in reducing amputation rates in CLTI in a multi-center clinical trial.

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Murphy explained that creation of the Indiana Center for Regenerative Medicine and Engineering at IU School of Medicine has helped to advance his research. The Indiana Center for Regenerative Medicine and Engineering under Chandan K. Sen, PhD, the J. Stanley Battersby Chair and Professor of Surgery, Director of the Indiana Center for Regenerative Medicine and Engineering who is a renowned leader in regenerative medicine, has added many benefits to researchers by aiding his expertise in clinical trial design, preclinical animal models, funding mechanisms, and as a collaborator.

As an educational institute, Murphy's lab is also creating future scientists and surgeons. Murphy hosts both medical students and residents in the laboratory under the division of vascular surgery within a two-year research fellowship.

"My laboratory, as well as some of my colleagues' laboratories, offers a two-year fellowship. During that time, residents and fellows could earn a master's degree, which I highly recommend, in biostatistics, immunology or clinical research," said Murphy.

Murphy's work, along with the Indiana Center for Regenerative Medicine and Engineering and IU School of Medicine, have gained prestige as leaders in their prospective fields. Murphy hopes to help Hoosiers who have been told that the only option for their condition is amputation and change their outlook and options.



I do not have all the answers but put together some discussion points with various companions and we may arrive.

Made many discussion points over the years in Sword and Trowel, getting councils to accomplish something, anything. For a long time talked about a 3-legged stool, Farmers milking stool. One leg Ritual, a leg for activities, a leg for Community activities.

Then noticed other lodges, other jurisdictions, talking on Facebook; "Mentioned a few times that if we do not take Masonry out of the Lodge room it will die. I am not saying we should not study the esoteric side of our Craft. I'm not saying we should not have Tiled meetings for Brothers only. We do and should.

I am saying we need to take those lessons learned in Lodge and apply them outside of Lodge.

We are builders. Do we put "sweat equity" in to our communities? Do we reach out to other groups and help them with their missions?

I'm not dogging anyone by any means. But to raise awareness of lodges. Reach out to the local church and ask if they honor St John's day. If so offer to work in the kitchen to help them celebrate. Maybe attend their service. Memorial Day: hold a ceremony to honor the fallen soldiers of your town. Invite everyone to attend and let the local Clergy to give opening and closing prayer. If you have a local American Legion or VFW post, contact them and see if your lodge can assist. Even if just providing coffee and donuts. The possibilities are there we just have to open our eyes, step out in faith, and act upon them. Ask, seek, and knock."

For years our York Rite did nothing, except read the minutes, pay our bills, and go home, NOW WE ARE PAYING THE PRICE. I talk to people about their lodge, York Rite and I receive, our lodge has dinner, we open, read minutes, pay our bills, close, and go home, sound familiar? Once in a while, we do talk about Shriners or Scottish Rite, but York Rite, NO.

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Recorder Essentials

SECRETARY and/or RECORDER ESSENTIALS

Forms and Documents you will need are located at the Grand York Rite website, which is: www.yorkriteofcalifornia.org. The new website will require you to have a userid, and to have established a password. Once you LOGIN, you will see a long white line, above which you will see:

Then click on the appropriate FORMS. In ROYAL ARCH FORMS, scroll down to Officers Manual, which has information for the Secretary, and print that out. Many concepts in the Grand Chapter manual are relevant to Councils and Commanderies.

Priorities are as follows:

- 1. <u>Dues Collection</u> You should send out dues notices no later than October, with payments from members due by December 31st.
- 2. <u>Membership control</u> Membership information is now managed in the MMS system Masonic Membership Solutions. Important changes to your membership include new members, suspensions, demits, and deaths. Maintain e-mail addresses for members and you can easily then forward the monthly newsletter, The WORKMAN, to them.
- 3. Do not cavalierly suspend members for non-payment of dues. There is a Constitutional process that should be followed rigorously in order that members, who may have moved and not received your dues notice, are treated fairly. See the following sections of the relevant Constitution in order to learn about this process:

- 4. Per Capita The Per Capita payment, due each Jan 15th for Chapter and Councils (and April 1st for Commanderies) does not require action by the Chapter, Council or Commandery to be paid. You will need good, up-to-date end-of-year numbers of active members in MMS. This is the source of your Per Capita bill. Without good data on your membership in MMS you will most likely overpay your per capita requirement. It is sensible to begin your process near the end of the CY, as soon as possible. It is also sensible, if you have access to the Grand Lodge database, to check each member to see if they are still alive. Do so before the end of the year. But most important is getting a userid to utilize MMS so you can enter deceased and suspended data.
- 5. <u>Insurance</u> -- The Insurance payment, due each July 15th, does not require action by the Chapter, Council or Commandery to be paid. You will be billed for the payment by the Grand Secretary or Grand Recorder.
- 6. <u>Lodge Book of Marks</u> Maintain this up-to-date, or perhaps arrange for a PHP to take on the responsibility of maintaining.
- 7. <u>Minutes</u> Take good minutes, but don't over-do it by trying to capture everything that is said. Focus on having a clear representation of motions made and the vote

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count by which they passed or failed. In addition to keeping petitions in a separate file, it is good practice to replicate the basic petitioner information in the minutes. It is also a good practice to keep the names of attendees at each meeting in the minutes. If conferring a degree, keep a copy of the cast members and the candidate(s). Also, please send the candidate class names to the Grand Secretary or Grand Recorder.

- 8. Grand Sessions Before the May meeting, remind the Dais officers they are responsible to attend; and arrange a stipend if your Chapter, Council or Commandery can afford it. Remind members who expect to attend to be sure to take their dues cards. If Dais Officers of the Chapter and Council cannot attend, they may issue a proxy, or they may elect a representative. This is true also for Commanderies, whose members, however, cannot issue proxies. The appropriate Chapter forms can be obtained on the Grand York Rite website: Scroll to "Elected Representative and Proxy Credentials." Or, alternatively, the forms for all three bodies can be found at www.ca-gyrs.org.
- 9. Order of High Priesthood Be sure the current HP and PHPs know they are eligible to receive this Order. In fact, it is a Constitutional requirement! Share the petition with them and send to the Grand Secretary. This requirement does not appear to be true for the Thrice Illustrious Master Degree or the Past Commander's Association. Petitions for all three bodies are available at the www.ca-gyrs.org.




